Objectives	The changes in the position of women in China in the last century or so are well recognized, and no account of contemporary China would be complete without due considerations of the active and vocal roles women are playing in the private and public spheres nowadays. These changes, however, did not come about as a result of the efforts of modern women advocates alone, but in fact represented the last phase of a long process of transformations that the women situations have gone through in history. This subject will offer a nuanced understanding of women's role in Chinese history, taking the students beyond the modern period into the ancient past, where they will learn not only about the social and familial odds with which women had to contend, but also the many remarkable contributions they made to the development of Chinese culture. This subject will include substantial reading and writing assignments for the fulfillment of the Chinese Reading and Writing Requirements in Chinese session.

Teaching/Learning Methodology (Note 3)	The instructor will provide the theoretical frame during the lecture to analyze the subject's contents, while tutorials will be given to in-depth discussions of selected topics from the readings. Students will be asked to contribute to the class orally and in writing, both of which will allow them to reflect on what they learn. A mid-term and a final quiz will test students' grasp of their knowledge of the content of the subject. A term paper (2,000-3,000 characters in Chinese) on a topic that evolves from discussion with the instructor or assigned will solidify students knowledge of the subject while facilitate their independence in thinking and writing.
